A REFUGEE'S PSALM

This reflection was preached by a Syrian pastor to a church full of displaced Christians. It was first published in our Lent resource for 2016, *Live Like a Refugee* and it would make a good, simple talk for a church service.

PSALM 142 (NIV)

"David cried aloud to the Lord, he poured out his complaint before Him."

The book of Psalms is a Bible in itself. In this book we find all kinds of psalms that express emotions, feelings that represent all situations of life. You will find people asking God to intervene in what they are going through.

Psalm 142 is written in a crisis situation.

"Is not everyone against us?" David asks. I see in this psalm a cry of deep pain. David is saying that no one is concerned about him. Many times you see words about pain in this psalm, a pain that is killing from inside. When the writer is crying, he says what he is feeling about God. He speaks about God as someone from a distance feeling as if God is far away; he speaks of 'Him', not of 'You'.

God wants to hear your voice, He wants to hear what your feelings are, not just nice words. When we are honest in our feelings, God meets us, God comes to us. David is confused: in all the pain, where is God? When he becomes honest in his prayers, 'Him' becomes 'You'. God comes close.

You also see the suffering of a lonely man, a complaint about the situation he is in.

Maybe he thought, 'When I defeated Goliath everyone thought me to be a hero. Now I have nowhere to run, no one asking for me, no one concerned about me. I am displaced, I don't have a place to live.'

Then you see in verses 5 and 6 David speaking about the portion of a believer. "You are my refuge, my portion." When David felt God near, he was able to see that God was his only portion. In the presence of the Lord, you are not alone; you can come from complaining to praising. Just come as you are.

"Then the righteous will gather about me because of your goodness to me." He expresses that at the end God will be good to him. That is sure for every believer, that the presence of the Lord doesn't depend on circumstances. He doesn't always remove the pain. Sometimes we have to go through it and we have to overcome situations.

Living with Jesus is living on another level. Uniting you with God, surrendering to Him, means that you are stronger than the pain you are going through. When no one understands you, go to God. Send Him your e-mail, He will come and you will feel the glory of His presence.
