

LETTER FROM HENRIETTA

Worth the cost

"When he had found one pearl of great price, [he] went and sold all that he had and bought it." MATTHEW 13:46

Most of us don't have to choose between our safety and our faith. We don't have to decide whether following Jesus is worth the cost of our family, our jobs or even our lives. But there are large numbers of Christians who are making that choice every day - and recognising that Jesus is worth the cost.

I find stories like Ji Ho's* in North Korea (p6) so challenging and inspiring. She follows Jesus in a country where any expression of faith could be a death sentence, and she hasn't seen her father since the state police dragged him away for owning a Bible. But hearing Scripture on the radio helped her to stand strong, empowered by truth. She can still say, "Jesus wanted to be my Lord and Saviour – and I wanted to follow Him. in the same way my father had."

When everything is stripped away, what are you left with? The unchanging nature of Jesus is, in the end, the only thing we can stand on. In the West, we don't always get that. But our brothers and sisters in the persecuted church – like Ji Ho – truly understand it. Their wholehearted faith is extraordinary.

Let's continue to stand with them. One way you can do that is by inviting your MP to the World Watch List 2024 parliamentary launch on 17 January (see the enclosed letter, or visit opendoorsuk.org/advocacy). With a UK election coming up, MPs from both main parties have told me their constituents' views really matter – so let's tell them! Please pray that this event helps change the hearts of people in power in this country – so that they speak out for, and act on behalf of, persecuted Christians like Ji Ho. It's more important now than ever. Thank you.

Christians sent

back to extreme danger

Christians are among the 600 refugees that China has recently sent back to North Korea, putting them at grave risk of torture, imprisonment or even death.

"I have personally experienced repatriation once, and I am familiar with the process of imprisonment, torture and punishment that follows," Timothy Cho* wrote in a letter to MPs, in his role as Co-Secretariat of the **UK All-Party Parliamentary** Group on North Korea, exhorting them to raise the matter in Parliament.

He believes that China has 'cvnically' used the world's focus on Israel and Gaza to make the move without attracting attention.

"Many of these refugees are Christians, women and children, including recently born babies," he adds. "Anyone that has been associated with Christian churches or missionaries while they were in China is likely to be dealt with particularly severely; indeed, many are likely to be executed."

PRAY That the UK Parliament will act wisely and compassionately in response to these actions, and that all refugees will be kept from harm.



UK A Saharan adventure

A 100km walk is arduous enough - but what about doing it in the Sahara Desert? That's the mammoth challenge tackled by Shagass Pam (ABOVE) to raise money for our persecuted family.

"I've always given to charities supporting other people, people who God loves deeply, but the thought of neglecting to do the same for my own family seemed like something I had been missing," says Shagass from Crawley, who first heard of Open Doors at university.

The five-day trek was concentrated on the north west rim of the desert in Morocco, east of Marrakech. It was undertaken through Charity Challenge and, so far, Shagass has raised more than £1,500! You can donate to him at justgiving.com/page/trek-1696162270066

DRC

Believers in 'despair and disillusionment'

A Christian community in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) is 'losing hope' following a spate of attacks that killed at least 39 people.

Armed men stormed Masosi. a Christian neighbourhood in Oicha, North Kivu province. At least 35 bodies, including those of 12 children, were identified. "Many of these people are Christians, they were servants of God, and teachers in our schools," said Reverend Gabriel, a church leader. "It is the church that is under attack."

Two days before, Mumbere Kafukuliro and Mbambu Ndalva - both from the Pastoral School in Oicha were killed as they were on their way to work at their farm. Earlier that month, two other Christian men - Pastor Mbusa Lisasi and his brother. Kakule - were kidnapped and killed.

"The Christian population of Oicha is in despair and disillusionment," says a field source. "They are losing hope."

These incidents are amongst many in the eastern North Kivu province of DRC, making it a place of extreme danger for Christians to live.

PRAY For God's comfort to engulf those grieving, and pray for protection of believers in DRC.

Healing from trauma

"Thank you for allowing God to use you to mend broken hearts," says Bethany*, a Nigerian Christian who's rediscovering joy after different incidents left her 'heartbroken and hopeless'.

You may remember Mary*, whose story we featured last year (Prayer Diary, May-June). In February 2023, shortly after Fulani militants released her from captivity, Mary died from an unrelated illness. For her mother, Bethany, the trauma wasn't over: four months later she was kidnapped by militants and held for a month.

Like her daughter, Bethany spent time at the trauma centre run by Open Doors local partners. "I dropped everything that made me sad at the feet of Jesus, and I felt peace and joy," she shares. "If I did not attend, I don't think I would be alive today. But God is not done with me yet. Thank you."

And you weren't done with Bethany either! Before her death, Mary asked that funds given by local partners would go towards a plot of land, so her family could have a new home. Further funds were given to help build the house, the construction of which continued even whilst Bethany was in captivity. After completing the trauma programme, she was taken to her new home. Breaking down in tears, she said, "I lack the best words to say thank you."

PRAY That Bethany and her family will find complete peace of mind and heart after everything they've gone through.

Ji Ho* vividly remembers the moment she saw her father for the last time. North Korean security agents had ransacked their house. They didn't find what they were looking for in the house – but they did discover something by digging deep in the garden.

"They found the book, wrapped in plastic," she remembers. "One of the policemen came inside, holding the book. He kicked over our small table as we cowered in the corner, flinging dishes everywhere, and threw the book down at my father's feet."

She pauses. The memory is still painful.

Ji Ho never learned precisely where her father went. At the time, she didn't even know what the 'secret book' was. "I didn't see what was so bad about it," she says. "My father loved to read me stories and sayings out of the book — about a wise man who sat on a mountain and began to teach. Why would a lesson about kindness be so dangerous in North Korea?" Only years later did she realise it was a Bible.

In some ways, Ji Ho was 'fortunate'. When a Bible is found in the home of a North Korean, it usually means the whole family is in terrible danger. As Open Doors secret fieldworker Brother Simon* explains, "North Korean Christians actually risk their physical lives - not only for themselves, but for their whole family. Because when they practise their Christian activities and one of them is exposed as a Christian, the whole family gets the same punishment. Sometimes that means a whole family is killed or banished to political camps."

Ji Ho was determined to find out what her father's secret had

been. What had meant so much to him that he was ready to count such a severe cost?

JI HO FINDS JESUS ON THE RADIO

But there was one other hidden thing in Ji Ho's house that the police agents hadn't found: her father's radio.

"He wanted to know if there was anywhere that had food," recalls Ji Ho. "He thought maybe China had some to offer, and that he could sneak over the border." After her father was taken, Ji Ho started listening too – hoping to find a source of food. One evening she was turning the dial and found a

new station. She realised, with a start, that they were talking about the same 'wise man' her father had told her about. The one who was in the secret book. They called Him 'Jesus'.

"From then on, I listened to the station every chance I got," she says. "I heard other things about Jesus: 'Man does not live by bread alone', 'The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ' and the most amazing thing of all: 'For God so loved the world, that He gave us His only son, that whoever believes in Him will not perish but will have everlasting life.'

TAUGHT TO HATE CHRISTIANITY

It can be almost impossible for a parent to teach their child about Jesus in North Korea. It comes with enormous risk. Children are often trained by their teachers to look out for any clues of Christianity, and encouraged to inform on their parents.

"According to the messages sent from North Korean believers, their main concern is how they can pass on their Christian faith to their children, the next generation of the North Korean church." shares Brother Simon. "But it's hard - North Koreans have been taught to hate Christianity their whole lives. They are officially taught that Christians, especially pastors and missionaries, are spies or enemies. Christians are targeted, and must be rooted out and eradicated in North Korea."

This indoctrination has to be unlearnt. Ji Ho soon began to see Jesus speaking to her through the verses she heard on the radio – and that, far from being enemies of North Koreans, Christians were called to love their neighbours.

"I'd come home, exhausted from the work in the fields, my heart still hurting at the loss of my father, and I'd think about the poem I'd heard on the radio: 'The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want'," Ji Ho says. "I'd see a neighbour whom I knew was hungry, and

I heard the words of Jesus: 'Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'"

FOOD SHORTAGES

These words from Psalm 23 and Matthew 25 are particularly significant to anyone living in North Korea, where extreme poverty threatens huge numbers of people. "The main problem is the need for daily life necessities to survive," says Brother Simon. "Absolute poverty has flourished throughout the country." Any food that does enter the country is given to the elite and the army, leaving ordinary people - particularly those in rural areas - in dire need of food. The UN special rapporteur for human rights in North Korea has estimated that 42% of North Koreans are malnourished due to food shortages.

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Many fear a repeat of the 'Arduous March' of the 1990s – a famine in which up to 3.5 million North Koreans died of starvation. While the situation has improved a little since pandemic restrictions were eased, and more food has got into the country through official or unofficial routes, believers are often at the end of the line when it comes to distribution of

this food. Anyone known to be from a Christian family - if they somehow avoid execution or a prison camp – is treated as a member of the 'hostile class'. That means they have limited access to food, jobs or homes.

Remembering Jesus's words about helping her brothers and sisters, Ji Ho has made extraordinary sacrifices, "As I continued to learn more about Jesus, I also found that my life was changing in other ways. I was still hungry, but I started to share my food," she says. "I knew I could give up some of my food to my neighbours who didn't have a garden. I hoped this might show them in some way that Jesus loved them."

NO FREEDOM

Ji Ho shows Jesus's love with generosity that comes at great cost, given the dire state of the country - but has to keep her faith secret, in order to survive. Otherwise, she might end up like the tens of thousands of Christians held in labour camps across the country. There is no freedom of religion or belief at all in North Korea. For almost all of the past 20 years, it's been the place where Christians face the worst persecution in the world.

"I know that it would be dangerous to tell anyone about Jesus." savs Ji Ho. "Our leaders don't want us to worship

anyone or anything besides them. I've realised that's why my father was taken – they saw he had a Lord that was bigger than our country's leaders."

A GROWING CHURCH

Despite this terrible cost, more and more North Koreans are encountering Jesus and deciding to follow Him. Even in this desperate situation. the church is growing! Some, like Ji Ho, are hearing about Him through Open Doors' radio ministry. This is operated outside of the country, reaching thousands of secret North Korean believers every day.

North Korea only officially sells radios tuned to state frequencies, so people must find radios on the black market or get radios networks in another country.

Daily broadcasts include Scripture reading, Bible studies and more. They help disciple and encourage the underground church in North Korea, while sometimes also being the first time someone hears the name of Jesus at all.

other persecuted Christians. "They asked us to produce a radio programme about the persecuted church," shares Brother Simon. "They cannot materially help persecuted churches - but they can join by praying with their brothers and sisters for persecuted churches."

DESPERATE NEED

But the North Korean church cannot flourish if it is on the brink of starvation. "The first prayer request is that we help North Korean Christians physically survive," says Brother Simon. "Through our networks in another country, we distribute food and medicine, especially in wintertime."

Through these underground networks, Open Doors secret workers are currently sustaining 100,000 North Korean believers with vital food and aid, shelter and discipleship training. That's only possible with the help and prayers of people like you.

"I'll continue to learn more about Jesus and how I can follow Him more closely – and I'll continue to be salt to the people around me," says Ji Ho. She has so little, but is determined to do what she can to show Jesus's love to the desperate people around her.

RAISE YOUR **VOICE FOR CHRISTIANS WHO ARE** COUNTING THE COST

The World Watch List 2024 will be launched in parliament in January will you make sure your MP is invited?

When Pastor Zachariah discovered that his wife and child had been killed in an attack on their village, he was devastated and traumatised. "Since this incident, no matter what I am doing, I will always remember what we went through," he says. "Even when I am praying, I get lost thinking of the incident. That day I cried like never before; it was on that day I knew that death was truly painful."

Understandably, Zachariah (PICTURED) - a church leader in Mangu, Plateau State, Nigeria wasn't sure where God was in this awful situation. "Honestly, when this attack took place, I felt as if God had forsaken me, because I said if God is in control, why would He allow these people to cause this kind of attack on us? Where is He that He will not take charge of the situation?"

Sadly, Pastor Zachariah's experience is becoming more and more common. Nigeria was number six on the World Watch List 2023. Violence against Christians is increasing – more Christians are killed for their faith in Nigeria than the rest of the world combined.

"We should rely on God because He is everything we live for."

But Pastor Zachariah and his church are not alone. Thanks to your prayers and support, local Open Doors partners were able to come alongside them with trauma healing ministry.

"Your organisation called us for counselling and trauma healing for affected individuals and I learnt a lot," says Pastor Zachariah. "This teaching has encouraged me greatly because right now I am asking God to forgive our attackers, and for

them to enter the Kingdom of God and not to die in their sins. Had I not come for this counselling, I would not have been living a good life - but since I came for this programme, now my mind is at rest."

PERSECUTED CHURCH

Among the Ashes is a new, five-part resource for small groups, which focuses on the issue of lament. Using powerful testimony from the persecuted church, the series looks at how certain psalms teach us about the four 'movements' of lament, starting with the need for us to be honest with God, then recognising God's presence, relying on His promises and, finally, waiting for a reply.

Lament is not easy to talk about. We naturally prefer to focus on more positive, upbeat subjects. And yet, suffering and loss are universal. Everyone will experience some kind of loss in their lifetime. And the Bible is full of passages which talk about suffering, grief and absence.

So, clearly, all Christians should explore this topic. And what better time than during Lent? What better time to open up what it means to be among the ashes than in the period which begins with Ash Wednesday itself?

Among the Ashes comes as five high-quality videos, filmed in evocative locations around Britain and presented by staff and associates of Open Doors. You can also order a free discussion quide for small groups with questions for reflection and ideas for prayers.

Of course, this resource can be used at any point during the year. But if you are running Lent groups, or if you want to use this period to open up these issues with your church or small groups, then *Among the Ashes* will prove a powerful, memorable and, we hope, transformative experience.

Released every January, the Open Doors World Watch List ranks the countries where Christians risk the most to follow Christ.

This year, the theme is 'counting the cost'. In a very real sense, this is exactly what the list does: it uses extensive, on-the-ground research to show how many Christians have to pay a price for their faith, and rank the countries where this costs the most.

But the list is more than a set of numbers: it really reflects millions of individual stories. Behind the data are millions of daily decisions, millions of people who have decided to follow Jesus, no matter the cost.

Because every member of the persecuted church pays a price for following Jesus. For some, the price is knowing that they will always be at the end of the line, always treated unfairly and fighting for justice. For others, the price is paid in bruises and beatings, in prison sentences and pain. Some must give up their home, their family, their security. Others know that they will always be the targets and scapegoats. The cost of discipleship is paid in sleepless nights and days full of fear.

Counting the cost: it's what every persecuted Christian does. And what's really amazing is that they consider it a price worth paying.

THE PEARL AND THE FIELD In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus describes the Kingdom of God as something beyond value.

"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it." (Matt. 13:44-46)

When we think about the persecuted church, it's easy to focus on the price, and forget about the pearl. But the point of these parables is that the Kingdom of God is worth the price. It's worth everything. When they decide to follow Jesus, persecuted Christians know that they will have to give everything. But it's worth it, because they have discovered the treasure for which they have been searching all their life.

This, then, is the truth which the World Watch List reveals: that behind the shocking figures, there is a joyful, living faith. As Pastor Zachariah, who features on the cover of the Top 50 says, 'I want to tell people who find themselves in situations

like we have experienced, my prayer for you is that we should rely on God, because He is everything we live for. Believers like Zachariah have discovered the truth: the Kingdom of God is real. As real and alive as a field. As thrilling and exciting as hidden treasure. As solid and beautiful and priceless as a pearl.

The 'wanted' Yemeni

shunning safety for Jesus

Sometimes the death threat came as a text message, at other times a phone call. Although Saleh* from Yemen was used to the risk, this time felt different – and faith more costly than ever.

THE PERSON 'WHO KNOWS JESUS'

Courageous faith has been a theme of Saleh's life, ever since he bravely told his father that, whilst studying, he'd been exploring Christianity – only to discover his father was a Christian! He kept his faith hidden, for fear of the dangers if his son accidentally revealed his faith.

After becoming a Christian, and sensing a call to church leadership, Saleh and a friend regularly evangelised outside their local mosque. They became known as the 'crazy guys', such was their boldness. In Yemen, it's illegal to convert

from Islam to Christianity, and accusations of apostasy can lead to the death penalty.

Wherever Saleh went, he told Yemenis about Jesus – including at a refugee camp in a nearby country, after fleeing because of war. "I became known as the person 'who knows Jesus,'" says Saleh. "There were deep conversations and many people came to know Christ."

"But what kind of Christians would we be if we weren't risking our life for others to know Life?"

Yemen remained on Saleh's heart, leading to him creating a house church network when he returned. With 70% of believers in Yemen unable to gather, it's

meeting a huge need – but it's costly. "If we sit at home and do nothing, we would be safe," says Saleh. "But what kind of Christians would we be if we weren't risking our life for others to know Life?"

And so it proved for Saleh: he started receiving death threats.

"GOD DID A MIRACLE"

In 2022, Saleh's brother Issam*, and friend Mussa* whom Saleh led to Jesus, wanted to visit an area to baptise believers. However, given his notoriety with the authorities, Saleh didn't go. "They messaged, telling me they had boarded the bus and were en route [to the baptism]," recalls Saleh. "After that text, I lost communication with them."

Police had boarded the bus and arrested Issam and Musa for apostasy. The incident meant the authorities had contact details of other believers, including Saleh. His name was among those distributed across Yemen, making it dangerous to cross checkpoints and leave the country. Saleh was 'wanted'.

"It was during those dark times when I felt God's presence with me."

For two months, Saleh hid in Yemen, fearing for his life as threats were made, whilst trying to get Issam and Mussa released. "There were days when I was hopeful and strong, and other times when I felt weak, guilty and depressed," he shares. "It was during those dark times when I felt God's presence with me."

Saleh and other believers prayed and fasted for Issam and Mussa – and thankfully, after eight weeks, they were released from prison. "God did a miracle," says Saleh. "He changed the heart of a person of influence who initially wanted them dead. He helped them to get out of jail! Afterwards, I realised why God allowed this to happen – God brought several prisoners to Him through them."

Meanwhile, the danger subsided for Saleh and he returned to his home outside Yemen. Today, helped by Open Doors partners, he travels to and from Yemen to serve 70 Christian families in the country, providing support including food, discipleship and training, but risks remain. "The church in Yemen is living in very harsh conditions, but is growing nonetheless!" he says.

Read Acts 12:1-19
There are striking similarities between Peter's story and Issam and Mussa's. All three were detained for their faith, with death a possibility, and all were miraculously released after the fervent prayers of others.

PONDER

- The miraculous release of all three followed prolonged and earnest prayer. Let this inspire your own prayer life.
- People were

 'astonished' by
 Peter's 'courage' in
 Acts 4:13. He's like
 Saleh, known as
 the 'madman' for
 his fearless faith.

 Where can you be
 more courageous
 in your faith?
- The stories of Mussa, Issam and Saleh could well have come from Acts, such is the faith and power displayed. How are you encouraged and challenged by this?

PRAY

"A wave of people have come to Christ since 2014 when the war began," says Saleh. "Because of extremists, people are horrified by what's being done in the name of 'religion." Ask the Holy Spirit to lead believers to those searching for truth.

The dangers and isolation of being a Christian can leave believers struggling for hope, causing some to doubt their faith. Ask God to reassure them of His love and provide them with fellowship.

Yemen is riddled by armed conflict, economic turmoil and a catastrophic humanitarian crisis. **Pray** for peace, provision and protection.
