

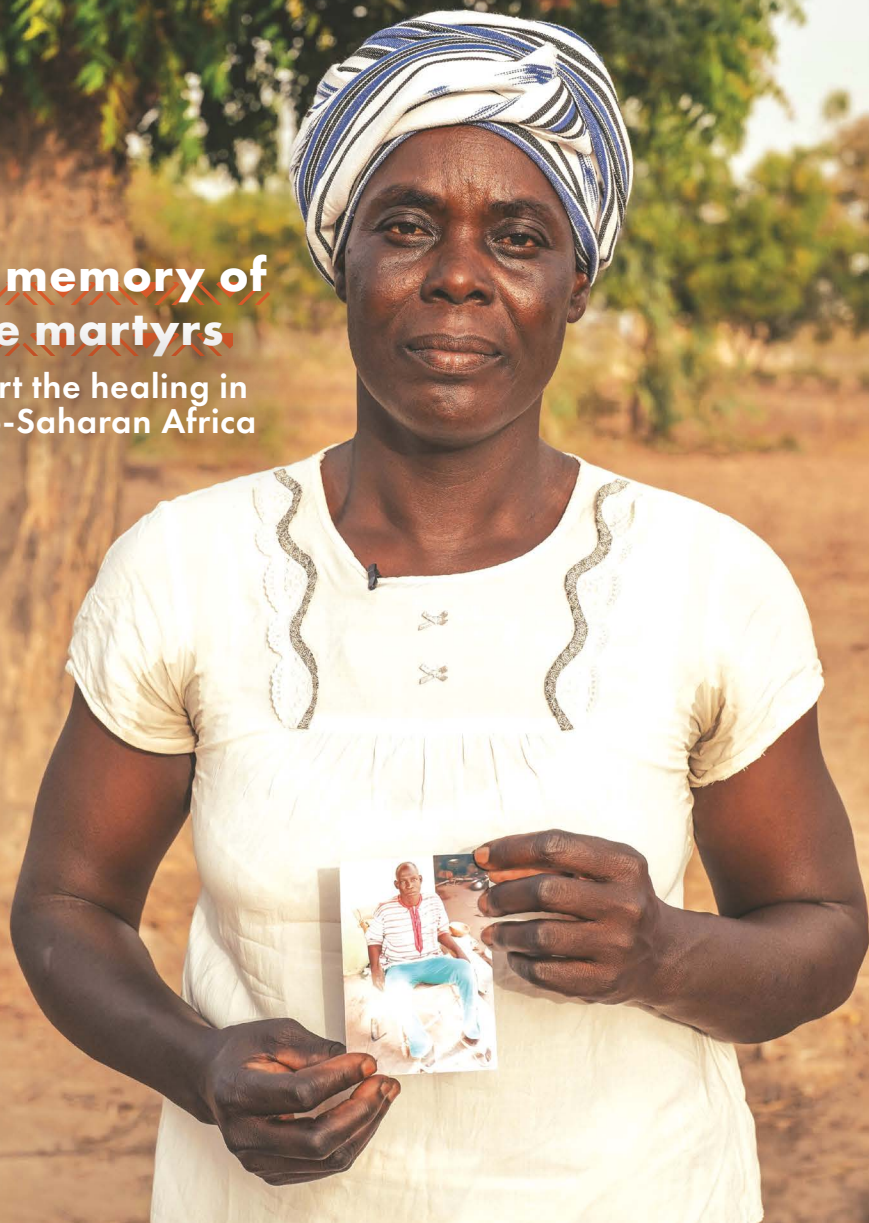

LETTER FROM HENRIETTA

Start the healing

"Lord my God, I called to you for help, and you healed me." PSALM 30:2

I was recently struck by the way an Open Doors partner – a trauma counsellor in Nigeria – described how challenging it was for people to forgive their attackers. She said unforgiveness was like a heavy stone you're always carrying. It's only through time, love and the power of the cross that people can forgive and heal.

Pastor Michée has experienced extraordinary trauma. His dad, brothers and uncles were among 31 killed in a brutal attack on his village in Burkina Faso (see p6). I'm very moved by his journey to forgiveness and healing, and his faith to continue supporting his community who desperately need trauma care. This need is repeated many thousands of times across sub-Saharan Africa, and it's one of the reasons why the *Arise Africa* campaign continues to be crucial.

On a personal note, this will be my final magazine letter. What an immense gift and privilege it has been to be part of this ministry for eight years! The testimonies of the persecuted church have deeply inspired me, and I've been constantly encouraged by your messages, faithful prayers and commitment to our persecuted brothers and sisters. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart.

I am sure you will offer the same prayers for my successor. I'm delighted that Tiffany Barrans, former Director of Advocacy at Open Doors International, has been appointed as the new CEO of Open Doors UK and Ireland. CHINA

Pastor released from prison

In a wonderful answer to prayer, Zion Church's Pastor Jin has been released after nearly nine months in prison and reunited with his family in the US.

Founded in 2007 by Pastor Jin, Zion Church is one of the most influential house church networks in China, with a membership of 10,000 across 40 cities. Last October, more than 30 believers from the church were arrested.

Whilst most have since been released, eight are said to be still held. The charges against them have changed from 'illegal use of information networks' to 'illegal business operations' and 'fraud', carrying the possibility of a harsher punishment.

Meanwhile, the crackdown continues elsewhere. "Two Sunday school teachers were taken from their homes by police on charges of sharing the gospel with minors," shares a partner in east China. "Furthermore, several Christian university teachers were suddenly taken on the same day from their homes for questioning."

PRAY for the health, strength and release of those detained for their faith in China.

VENEZUELA

Prayer requested following earthquakes

Christians in Venezuela are requesting prayer following the devastating earthquakes in June. More than 4,000 people have died, with thousands more injured, missing and displaced.

Vulnerable communities who were already experiencing difficulties are now experiencing growing economic uncertainty, including many Christians.

Life for believers in Venezuela is marked by pressure from the authorities and threats from criminal networks.

"There is a great deal of uncertainty," shares a local partner. "Even so, pastors and believers remain steadfast, accompanying people and bringing calm and hope in the midst of fear and instability."

PRAY for provision, healing and comfort for those affected, and for the church to be empowered in their response.

NIGERIA

UN experts speak up

In an encouraging development, the UN Special Rapporteur, Nazila Ghanea, has released her preliminary observations and recommendations on the violence against Christian women and girls in Nigeria following an official visit to the country.

"We cannot deny victims a voice."

Highlighting the increasing spread of violence by terrorists, gangs and bandits in Nigeria, she said, "Scores of innocent people experience killings, mass violence and the total decimation of their livelihoods, time and again, witnessing little or no justice." She added, "We cannot deny victims of grave violations a voice."

The report builds on a letter sent by UN experts to the Nigerian government over the 'deeply troubling' violence against Christian women and girls.

PRAY that these developments will prompt decisive and impactful action.

NIGERIA

"This help gives us new life"

"Thank you for bringing light back to my life," says a mother in Benue State, Nigeria, after you came alongside her family following an attack by radicalised Fulani militants.

"It was a terrible day for us," recalls Badoo*. Ambushed by militants, Badoo (who was pregnant at the time), her husband and five children fled in the dark of the night with nothing but the clothes on their backs. "They killed my mother-in-law and three of my brothers-in-law", she says.

The family fled to a displacement camp but, like so many in the region, it's dangerously ill-equipped to care for people. Badoo gave birth

there. With six children to feed and no income, the family's future looked bleak – until you stepped in. Through local partners, she enrolled in a six-month vocational training covering fashion design, catering and leather works. In total, 250 families in Benue State have been given this livelihood support.

"I'm a different person now, because of the help that you gave," says Badoo. "I can sew and earn money. I have used it to rent an apartment and I can send my children back to school. May God bless you abundantly for bringing help to the poor and displaced. The help gives us new life. I can't thank you enough."

PRAY that Badoo and others who've received this help will prosper in their faith and livelihoods.

STOP THE KILLING. START THE HEALING.



“My father was courageous. I have never seen anyone as courageous,” says Pastor Michée, walking through his village in Burkina Faso. “He was the second person to convert to Christianity in the village. He was deeply engaged in his faith. He loved his wife and us, his children.

“He was also a songwriter. Everybody was happy when he was singing, and everyone would feel the presence of God. This is how I would like him to be remembered.” As he speaks, Michée holds out a photo of his dad, Filibert. In the picture, Filibert is holding Michée’s young son, standing alongside his wife and Michée’s wife. It’s one of only two photos that Michée has to remember his father by.

Like many people who’ve lost a much-loved parent, Michée loves sharing stories of his dad and the inspiration he was to his family and many others. But Filibert’s death is painful to talk about. He, alongside dozens of other Christians, was martyred in a brutal attack on their village.

A TERRIBLE MESSAGE

“I was in bed when I received a message from a friend,” remembers Pastor Michée. “He said: ‘The village was attacked today.’ I tried to ring my father’s number, but it wasn’t going through.”

He managed to get in touch with his sister, who was hiding in the bush. She explained that Filibert had been handcuffed in front of her and taken away – and she didn't know what had happened to him. "Tears came to my eyes and my heart was deeply in pain," says Michée. "I didn't know what to say."

First thing the next morning, he tried to go back to the

village, but the military weren't letting anybody in. Somebody managed to send a photograph. "I recognised my father by his shoes," says Michée. That's when he knew for sure that Filibert had been killed.

HARMONY TURNS TO VIOLENCE

The attack on the villagers was a particular shock because the community had

lived for years in harmony. "Before the attack, the village was comparable to a small paradise for us," Michée remembers. "There was joy and a peaceful atmosphere."

"The church, which had started with only one person, had expanded. At the time of the attack, the church had almost 600 members including children, so almost all the people in the village were Christians. We were proud to worship God."

"There was an ethnic group called Fulani living with us. We were living together as if we were the same family, and we used to drink tea and play football together."

Things began to change when armed, militant members of the Fulani people group started coming to the village. They began turning the Fulani villagers against their Christian neighbours. "The trust that had been built was getting broken, bit by bit," Pastor Michée remembers.

On the day of the attack, everything happened rapidly. "In a blink of an eye, more than 100 terrorists entered the village," says Michée. "If they caught you, they handcuffed your hands behind you. There was

another group in charge of chasing the animals, and a third in charge of setting houses on fire.

"Some were lucky enough to escape. But the people who were handcuffed were brought to the church and their eyes were covered. They were all shot dead."

In one day, 31 Christian men were killed – including Michée's father, brothers and uncles.

"WE HAVE NOTHING LEFT"

In Burkina Faso, and across many parts of sub-Saharan Africa, this shocking violence

is increasing. Last year, at least 4,491 Christians in sub-Saharan Africa were martyred for their faith. It is a tide of violent persecution that is threatening the future of the African church.

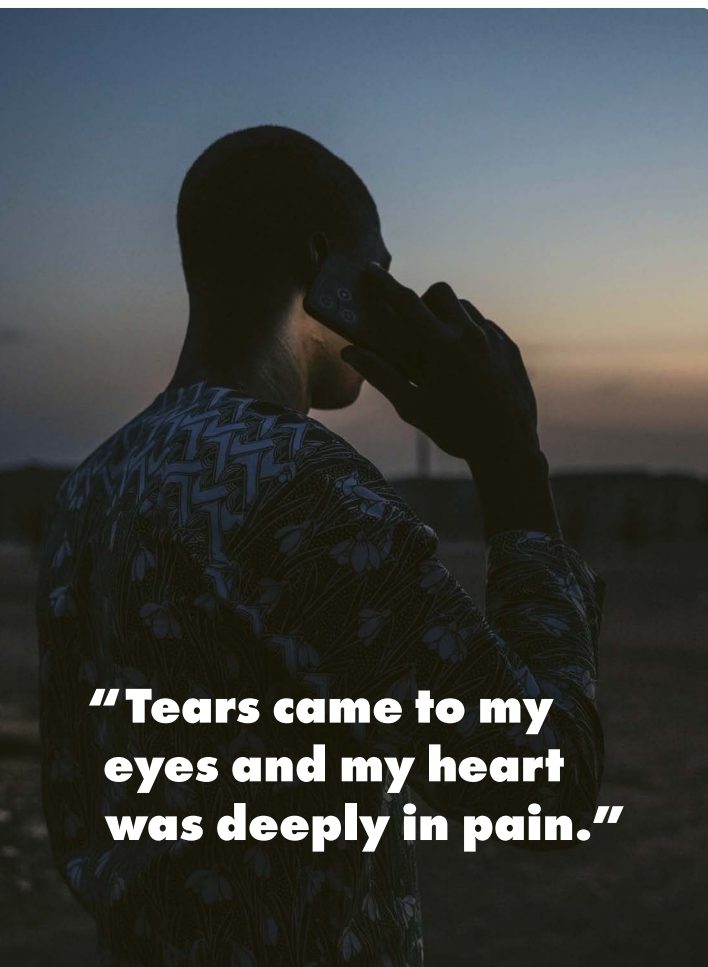
As Pastor Michée explains, the persecutors targeted men, but men weren't the only victims. "It was the women too, because the men who gave them hope and cared for their

needs were now gone," he explains. "The objective was to destroy the future of the village. They destroyed all our houses. Our possessions and animals were stolen. We had nothing left. The plan was to discourage the Christians in their belief."

And, for Michée, it looked at first like the attack had succeeded. "This had a very negative impact on my faith," he shares. "I asked, 'Why has God allowed this to happen?' For me, that was evidence that God had let us down."

"Prayer was no longer meaningful to me. As

a pastor, I was compelled to do it. But I was just uttering words. Deep down, I was doubting. I had a lot of bitterness in my heart.” All Michée could think about was taking revenge.

OPEN DOORS TRAUMA CARE

When Open Doors partners heard about the attack and the devastation it had caused, they came to offer relief aid and trauma care to the surviving villagers. Michée was among those invited to the trauma care training, and it has had an extraordinary impact on him.

“Untreated trauma is contagious.”

“It really changed my life,” he says. “An untreated trauma is contagious. The trauma I was going through almost destroyed my faith in God, my ministry, even my relationship with my family. But after the training, my relationship with God was revived. I re-found hope in God.”

The attack on his village had cost Michée nearly everything he held dear. But the trauma care has shown him that Jesus was

near every step of the way, grieving with him and holding him close. “My anger was gone,” says Michée. “I lacked forgiveness, I had revenge in mind. All that was gone. I have been renewed.

“One thing that helped me was the sharing of personal stories. That really relieved me. I had the opportunity to cry when I was relating my testimony, and I felt that I got free from the bitterness within me.”

Michée knows keenly that this life-changing trauma care is only possible thanks to people like you. “I want to say ‘thank you’ to those who are supporting us,” he says. “It encourages us, it strengthens us and enables us to renew our engagement in worshipping God.”

“THEY ARE IN DIRE NEED”

Having benefited from the trauma care himself, Pastor Michée is keen to see other members of the community receive it too. “There are a great number of people who are going through trauma but are ignorant about it,” he says. “They are in dire need of this training that I received.”

He is currently providing trauma care for 16 people in the village, including many widows like Nathalie (p11). “I see that the hearts of many have been healed,” he says. But the scale of the need is huge, in Burkina Faso and across sub-Saharan Africa. Many more believers need to know they aren’t alone – that their global family hasn’t forgotten them, and that God never abandoned them.

NATHALIE’S STORY

Nathalie was an eyewitness to the attack, in which her husband Thomas was killed. She shares her story of hurt, healing and hope.



“I saw two people on a motorcycle coming in the direction of our house. I went straight into the church, knelt down and started praying. I came out and that’s when I saw the men lined up near the church. One terrorist asked me, ‘So you were praying to your God?’ I replied ‘Yes.’ And he asked, ‘Did your God answer your prayer?’ I said, ‘Yes, I think He will.’ And they laughed.

“After that, I went and hid in a small garden not far from my house. I lay down on my belly and watched. The terrorists were still bringing people to the church. As dark was falling, I heard a noise – ‘boooooom’. At that moment they shot the men. Then the terrorists shot their guns in the air and took off on their motorcycles.

“I stood up and said, ‘Jesus, You watched over me and nothing happened to me. I am going to my

house.’ When I got there, the whole house was on fire. I didn’t see any of my children, so I decided to go to a nearby village to find them. When we returned, they said that my husband was one of the people who were shot dead.

“By the end of the training, our hearts were freed.”

“Aah, it was very difficult to bear. The terrorists took everything we had and our house was burnt, so how could I take care of my children?

“My late husband was committed to serving God. He loved worshipping God and he used to sing at church. He took care of me and my children very well. He was such a good person.

“This organisation [Open Doors], through Michée,

gave us trauma care training. They came to give us peace in our hearts. The trauma care gave me a lot of strength. By the end of the training, our hearts were freed. I am not wondering any more why God let this happen.

“The organisation also gave us some food. When we received the practical support, I felt better. I would like you to pray for me to be able to provide for my kids. Pray for us to keep believing in God. Pray for us to stay healthy and keep worshipping God.”

"I would like us to honour the people we lost in the attack – our fathers, mothers, brothers and children," says Michée. "They died in Jesus' mighty name and they will be rewarded as they deserve. And for that, we must honour them."

"Our people died as strong believers, and we are asking God to help us have the same faith, worshipping Jesus. I am praying for my people to be delivered, consoled and restored."

Your signature, along with hundreds of thousands of others from around the world, will be presented to the UK government in November 2026. The *Arise Africa* petition will also be taken to the UN, EU and many national governments. The global target is for one million names joining with the African church in calling for protection, justice and restoration. 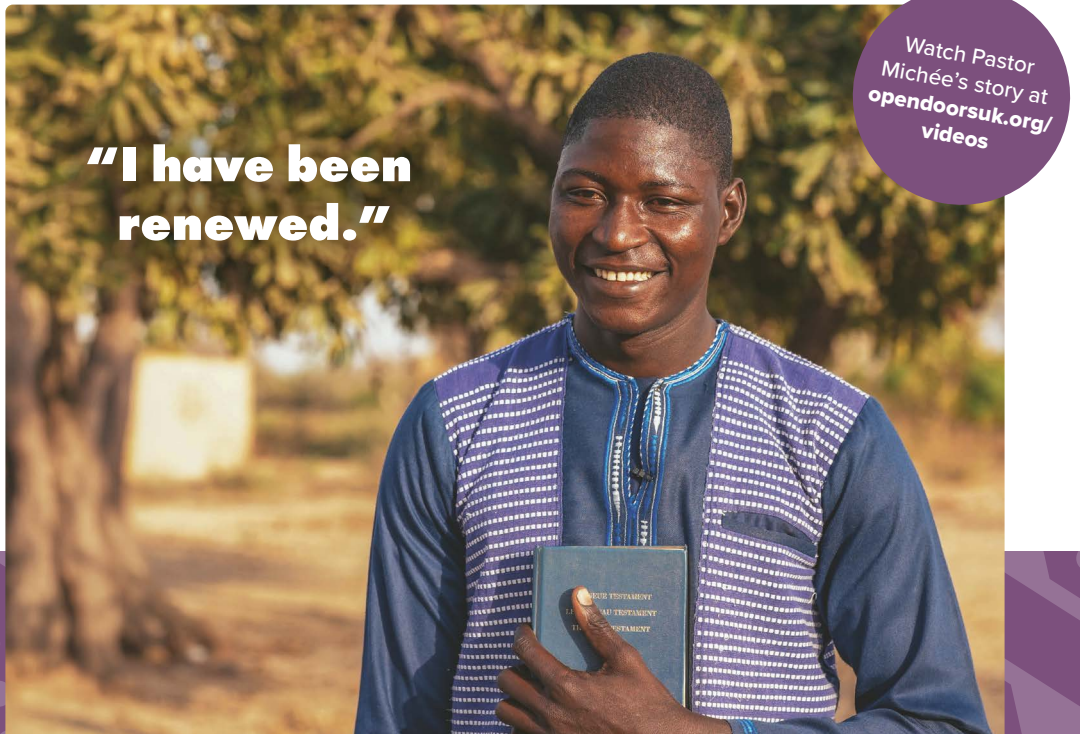
Recommendation #1: For humanitarian actors to promote among staff an understanding of religious vulnerabilities to prevent discriminatory

Any petition with more than 100,000 signatures is guaranteed a debate in the House of Commons. Please join us in praying that this is just the start of the impact the *Arise Africa* petition will have for vulnerable Christian communities in sub-Saharan Africa.

Please pray for crucial conversations with government ministers, for the parliamentary debate and for the long-term impact of the petition in effecting policy change. "Your prayers are highly important to us," says Pastor Michée. "It will encourage us to keep on being hopeful and continue our journey with God."

THREE REASONS TO **PRAY** WITH THE PERSECUTED CHURCH

Why pray for the persecuted church?

When you speak to persecuted Christians, prayer is the first thing that they ask for. It is as fundamental to their existence as food and drink. It changes things.

Sunday 1 November is a wonderful opportunity to join our persecuted church family and millions of others around the world through the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP). With this year's event taking place just days before the presentation of the global *Arise Africa* petition, you can order a free *Arise Africa* IDOP Prayer Pack to take to your church leader, and help your whole church pray with Christians in sub-Saharan Africa. It contains inspiring testimonies that remind us why prayer is so important.

1. Prayer is powerful.

In the pack, you'll find stories of our brothers and sisters – such as Pastor Josiah from Nigeria. His community is one of many attacked by Islamist extremists (see p18).

"Don't think your prayers are not being felt – they are," he says. "Through them, I have understood the love of believers. Prayers reach anywhere. There is power in prayer."

2. Prayer is connection.

Through prayer, we enter into the lives of our persecuted church family. We become connected. THE IMPACT OF YOUR GENEROSITY IN DRC

Countless lives have been upturned by extremist violence in the eastern part of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). But, with the help of your support and prayers, families are seeing hope in their futures once again. **Thank you!**

Thousands displaced, homes destroyed and livelihoods stolen – this has been the traumatic experience of countless families across DRC since last year. For many, life has become a question of surviving the day ahead, relying upon a small amount of money from harsh labour or the hospitality of others to get by.

Despite the efforts of the national military to combat the Allied Democratic Forces (ADF), who have been carrying out the brutal attacks, the extremist group has continued its territorial expansion in eastern DRC. Many families cannot return home for fear of further assault. Their futures seemed precarious – until, by the grace of God, you stepped in.

Christians in DRC worship the Lord and are thankful for your help

Through local Open Doors partners, more than 200 Christian families in the North Kivu province of eastern DRC are receiving life-transforming relief aid.

MESSAGES OF THANKS

ESPERANCE was displaced with her family of seven. "The ADF stormed our village, and I fled with my husband and six children to Butembo, leaving everything behind. After a brief calm, we returned and planted beans, but the ADF came back. We were forced again into Butembo, where we are living in extreme poverty. All of us have to sleep in two small rooms. The children are no longer in school, and to feed them we walk over 30km to collect grass to sell to livestock keepers.

"I never expected this help! Thank you for your generosity, and may it be returned to you a hundredfold."

MUINDO* is a new believer who also benefited from your vital support. "When my family discovered I had converted to Christianity, they threatened me and demanded I return to Islam if I wanted to stay. Eventually, they kicked me out, and the church welcomed me. The church strengthened my faith and today I received support and a Bible. What more can I say except thank you, thank you again and again."

TSONGO is a father of six who was forced to flee the most recent ADF attack earlier this year. "As rumours spread, my wife and I fled Musenge before the ADF arrived. My two daughters, Immaculée and Dacisse, stayed behind to shelter displaced Christians in our home. On 24 January 2026, they went to the farm to gather food but never returned. A week later, their bodies were found.

"My wife and I now live at my younger brother's house. We struggle to eat, and when nothing works, my son risks his life by returning to that same farm for food.

"The support we received today will help us survive. Thank you very much, and may God bless you."

AMAZA is a mother of seven and shares, "In 2025, the ADF attacked the neighbourhood where I lived in Magurejipa. With nowhere to go, we moved to another part of the village. We are now internally displaced and have lost access to our farms. I survive with my family by selling doughnuts. Truly, I thank the brothers and sisters who supported us today. A part of this support will feed my children, and the rest will strengthen our small business. May God bless you, and please continue to pray for security in our villages."

Because of your generosity, our brothers and sisters are being strengthened and equipped. They are reminded that they are part of the body of Christ and not forgotten by their global church family. Thank you!

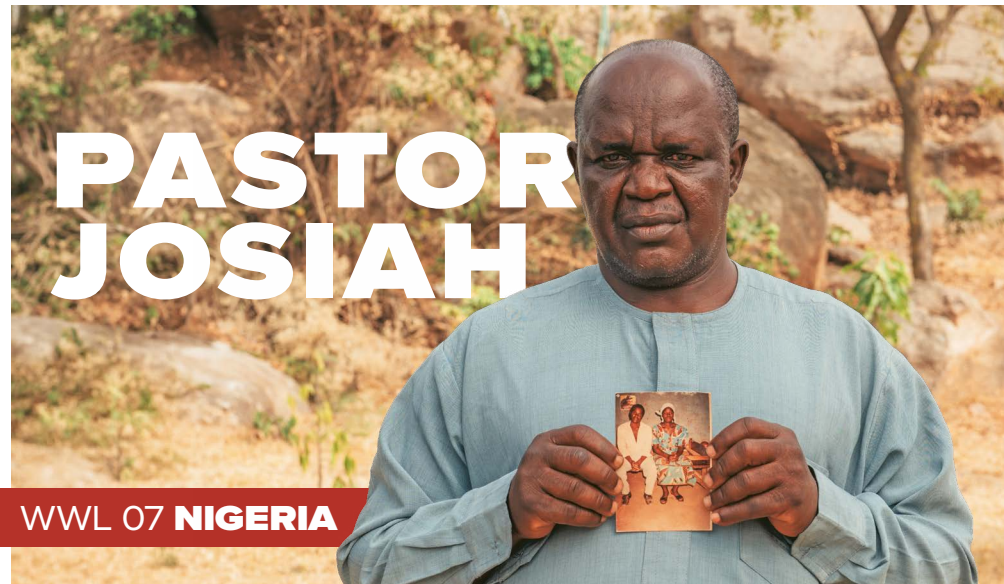

Pastor Josiah lost almost his whole family to extremist attacks in Nigeria. Because of your prayers and support, he is beginning to heal.

Pastor Josiah looks down at the photos in his hands, and his eyes begin to cloud over.

"Rowland loved singing in the church band," he begins, looking through the photos in turn. "Jonathan was never lazy, always up and doing things. Timothy

was a quiet person, always calm and resourceful."

He holds up another. "This is my favourite photo of my wife and me together, the first picture of us as a married couple."

"I was powerless; I couldn't do anything."

He gazes at the picture. After a long pause, he continues, "My wife was an industrious woman, hospitable and considerate, to the point that she allowed me to shine in the public eye whilst she looked after our home. Her spiritual life made me proud."

Josiah begins to weep as he remembers his wife and three sons, taken in an extremist attack.

"I WAS POWERLESS"

The day is forever etched in Josiah's mind – the day that radicalised members of the Fulani tribe invaded his home and shot his wife, Rebekah. "I kept hearing voices saying, 'Open the door.' As I did so, they grabbed my hands, tied me up and laid me on the ground. My two sons and my eldest daughter, Salama*, were already there.

"As we were taken, I could hear Rebekah crying, 'I'm going to die!' But I was powerless; I couldn't do anything.

"The kidnappers took us, and we started walking to the bush. We didn't stop until 7am when we got to their camp. I kept thinking about Rebekah. Did she die? Was she still alive?"

"WHERE IS JESUS NOW?"

Josiah and his family spent two and half months in captivity, barely surviving on meagre portions of food. Their kidnappers' hostility towards Christianity was fierce. "They said, 'You follow Jesus. Where is He now?' If I just bowed my head, they would say, 'He's praying!' and aim their weapons at me. We could only pray in our hearts."

In January, Josiah's sons were supposedly sent to retrieve the ransom payment for their lives. "The day my daughter and I were set free, I was told that our ransom had been paid. They left us at the roadside and, from there, my daughter and I walked back towards the village. My brother saw us coming and carried us back. I asked him where my sons were.

"That was the day I was told my boys, Jonathan and Timothy, had been killed by the kidnappers when they'd been sent to collect the ransom."

Only a few months later, his younger brother and his third son, Rowland, were also killed in extremist attacks.

"I felt like the world was crumbling in on me, as if I were alone with this pain," Josiah laments. "I kept thinking, 'Why did this all

happen to me?' When I remember Rebekah and the life we had together, I ask God, 'Why?'"

"I HAVE RECEIVED FREEDOM"

In his grief, Josiah was met by Open Doors trauma caregivers. One of them, Philip*, began to meet one-to-one with Josiah to help him process his loss.

"When I came to the trauma centre, my anger and bitterness reduced and I have received freedom," he explains. "I realised that forgiveness is almost impossible without God. It has helped me to heal from the bitterness and hatred, and I have forgiven them."

Josiah now plans to share all that he has received with others deeply affected by persecution. He sees clearly the pattern of violence infecting communities across Nigeria, but he also sees the impact of your support.

"My brethren in Christ, I want to say thank you for the relief you have given," he says. "Don't think your prayers are not being felt – they are. Through them, I have understood the love of believers. Believers' prayers brought me out of the bush. So, I am pleading and praying that you keep on supporting through your prayers and help."

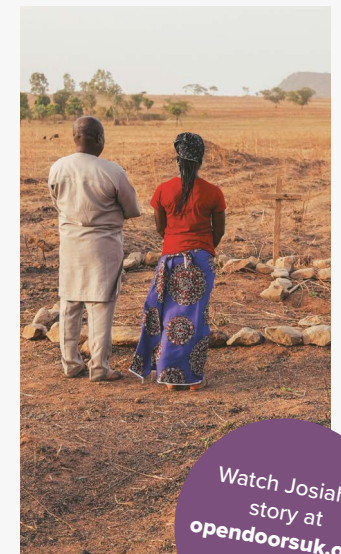
