#### STRONG CHURCH\* Faraydoun, Iraq



Income-generating projects mean that the church can be resilient and self-sufficient, not having to focus solely on survival. That's why your gifts and prayers continue to help Christians in Iraq like Faraydoun. He had to flee his home in Iraq when so-called Islamic State attacked. "They left us with nothing – no relatives, no houses," remembers Faraydoun.

But thanks to your support, Faraydoun got a microloan when his family were able to return. Now he runs a successful fish farm. Now he can support his family and his church. "We are thankful to you," he says. "Thank God there are good people like you."

# STANDING TOGETHER Eun Hye, North Korea

North Korea is the hardest place to be a Christian. Believers there often don't realise their worldwide family is standing with them. "I had no idea so many people were praying for us. Those prayers are really important," says Eun Hye\*\*, who managed to escape North Korea after being held in horrendous conditions.

# DEFYING PERSECUTION **Eyal, Eritrea**

Defying persecution means that, whatever attacks and discrimination are aimed at our worldwide family, they still worship Jesus and know that He has won the ultimate battle. Eyal\*, in Eritrea, didn't stop worshipping God when he was imprisoned, beaten and tortured: "We prayed, fasted and even witnessed to others. Many people accepted Jesus Christ."

Thankfully, Eyal was released. Open Doors supports those who have been imprisoned with practical relief and counselling as they rebuild their lives, continuing to serve God.

### SHARING JESUS NO MATTER THE COST Tammar and Nadina, Central Asia

Tammar and Nadina had to pay a terrible cost because of their determination to preach Jesus in their Central Asian church: the stress of persecution meant Nadina lost her baby after five months of pregnancy. A few months later, they were arrested after baptising several believers.

To recover, and to avoid the constant harassment and threats, Nadina and Tammar were supported at a safe house run by donations from Open Doors supporters. With this respite, they are ready to return and pastor their church. "Thank you to our brothers and sisters worldwide," says Nadina.
